

Westgrove relishes performing in Wisconsin

Brett Westgrove is becoming a regular at the Hodag Country Festival.

The Rib Mountain native first performed on the main stage in 2019 and hasn't missed a Hodag since.

Wisconsin is one of my favorite places to play, hands down," he told the River News in 2021. "I've been into music all my life, since I was 2. I have photos of me playing guitar. However, I never actually performed in Wisconsin until years after I left. I never did the bar

one-half of the duo Florida Georgia Line but he sure can get a crowd rocking all on his own. Fans can expect to hear Hubbard's first two No. 1 songs as a solo artist, "5 Foot 9" and "Dancin' In The Country.

"It's actually all over the place when I describe my music," West-grove said in 2019. "The best way to put it is modern country. If you look at my Spotify, it's a lot of '90s country up to current stuff, mixed in with some electro pop, and top 10 pop. So yeah, it's pretty extreme." Westgrove says having a festival

such as the Hodag — that offers a spotlight to newer, up-and-coming artists — is a huge blessing.

"As an independent rising artist it

can be very hard to get into festivals and shows that are bigger and that's so critical for growing a brand,' Westgrove said. "When I first met the Hodag crew and they first talked to me about playing, I was so excited about it because it's hard, it's really hard to get those opportunities. Especially because there are so many people trying to capture that. So to have someone trying to help new, rising artists and on top of it being home state show, it's something really special."


Jordan Blanchard has always been an original

Jordan Blanchard has always been an original. He was a self-described "troublemaker" as a child, but always kept true to himself and who he was. That pattern continued after he developed a love of music at a young age, learning to play keyboard by eighth grade. He also played saxophone in fifth grade and was in the jazz band throughout middle and high school. It was not until he was 20 years old, though, that he picked up a guitar.

At the time, playing at the Hodag Country Festival was not on Blanchard's radar. He simply wanted to be able to play songs he liked that he heard on the radio. He practiced diligently, at least two hours per day. Soon he was playing in front of friends and family. By 2021 he played 225 shows in a year.

Over time, he said he grew tired of playing other people's music over and over, and to



new material, or Blanchard to write his own

songs. He needed a change. It was at that time he made the decision to go to Nashville. He met with a producer and got to thinking he could write his own songs. By 2022, he hit the studio and produced his first track.

"I said, this is what I was supposed to do," he said. "I put a band together, and here we are playing. We're playing at the Hodag, you know?"

"My family often thought I was crazy, but that was nothing new," Blanchard said, laughing. "They had kind of felt that way about me all my life. I was always my own person and dedicated myself to what I liked to do. In high school it was sports. In my younger years I wanted to be a cowboy or a construction worker or whatever your dreams are when you are young. But I think you have to be a little bit

crazy to run a business of any kind. At the same time, they were always super supportive. And that meant so much to me.'

While he had gotten away from country music in high school, he started listening to it again after high school and heard an instrument he wanted to play. That instrument was a guitar. Once he got the idea that he was going to play, he let nothing get in his way.

Becoming a recording artist

There is pressure in keeping his team active and profitable. With band members, sales people, videographers, photographers and a social media manager, it can be stressful. Also, when one starts to achieve regional success, there is pressure to build on that.

Blanchard pointed to country superstar Toby Keith as one of his influences. He grew up listening to Keith and when Blanchard got into music, he marveled at Keith's style change over his career, moving from the '90s sound to a more rocking country sound. Blanchard said he was impressed with that.

As a performer,

though, there's another person who stands out to him.

"This is going to sound silly, but I do a lot of research on Taylor Swift." he said. "She is one of the greatest performers of all time. She has sold more tickets than anybody in the history of the world. We look at a lot of the elements of her live show and we incorporate them into our own.'


The songs

He finds inspiration in his own life when writing songs. "Running Red Lights" was the song he was least sure about when it was released, but one that he has heard so many people say is their favorite. The inspiration came from a relationship with a girl he liked, but not enough to continue dating. Of course, when she was gone, he missed her, and it was a bit of a back and forth that ultimately ended.

Blanchard said he believes the best songs come from personal experience. His goal is to connect with his fans who have had similar experiences in their lives, he added.

"I think that's the most beautiful thing about being an artist," he said. "There are people out there who feel the way I do and when I sing these songs, they can relate to them.'

Country Fest

Blanchard said he got a call in 2021 from a local radio station about a pick off for Country Fest, asking him to get involved. He did not win that competition, as a bigger band prevailed. By 2022, he had put a band together and entered the competition again. The first Hodag Pick Off he and his band attended brought them a second place. At the next they landed in third. The last competition, the Frog Country Kick Off, was where they finally qualified.

"One day I got a phone call, Blanchard said. "This lady said 'I'm from the Hodag Country Festival.' She told me they were cancelling the band's pick offs, because they wanted me to play the main stage.'

He and his band were getting their chance to get on the stage at what would become one of his favorite places to play

"I guess I never really dreamed we would take it as far as this has gone," Blanchard said of making the stage at the Hodag, right before Neal McCoy. "I just about lost it."

The Hodag is the biggest thing he's done to date, he said, noting that the Hodag is his type of festival. He loves tradition, the beer-drinking crowd, street meat and tacos and everything that goes along with Country Fest.

The early years

Blanchard comes by the troublemaker label honestly, at least in his younger days. In grade school, yellow slips of paper were given out for misbehaving. The goal was not to get any yellow slips.

"I set the record for the most yellow slips in kindergarten or something like that," he laughed. "It held for a long time. I have to still be top five or something.

As a kid he enjoyed being outside and being active. He got heavily into sports by high school and can draw some comparisons to performing now and sports in his past. Performing feels like a competition, he said.

"I've always been a dreamer," he said. "I've always been a little bit of a troublemaker. I've never been afraid to go my own way, regardless of the consequences.

If Blanchard had a chance to talk to a younger version of himself and give him any sort of guidance, he said he would tell him to get a guitar as soon as possible.

"I would tell him to keep doing what he's doing," he said. "I would tell him to keep being himself and that all of his work would be rewarded and to keep his priorities in order." He said he would not try to change anything about the path of his life.

Getting an early start

Entering the music business at just 15 years old can be a scary and eye-opening event and it wasn't any different for Maddie and Tae.

"It comes with a lot of ups and downs," Tae said. "We honestly didn't know what we were getting into at the age of 15 when we started working together. We just knew that we had this dream and we were going to chase it and try to make it happen no matter what."

The two moved to Nashville two years later and say that's when they really learned what the business was about, how to stand their ground, and what to do to be artists.

"There were a lot of sacrifices we had to make, but for us our passion was completely overriding all of those sacrifices and we knew we wanted this," Tae said. "It is very scary when you think about everything you have to give up and everything you have to do."

The two wrote their debut single "Girl in a Country Song" and 23 weeks after its debut in July 2014, the song reached No. 1 on the charts. It was the first debut single by a female duo to reach number one since The Wreckers did it in 2006

"It was cool because we were nervous that we were the only ones that kind of felt that way," Maddie said of the song. "Just how women were being portrayed was so odd to us at that point."

The two wrote the song not thinking anyone was going to hear it.

"Our record label got ears on this song and loved it and were passionate about it," Maddie said. "We went out on our radio promo tour and figured out that fans wanted to hear that same message. It was great to see the connections and start meeting fans with that first song.

In 2014, Maddie and Tae released their self-titled EP, featuring "Girl in a Country Song" as well as three new songs: "Sierra", "Fly", and 'Your Side of Town."

The duo released their debut album, Start Here, in August 2015 and co-wrote every song on the album. It's first single, "Fly" became a Top 10 hit on both Hot Country Songs and Country Airplay.

"We moved to Nashville to, number one, be songwriters," Maddie said. "That was our first dream. We never thought being an artist was an option, we never thought it would happen."

Maddie and Tae's third single "Shut Up and Fish" was released to country radio in November 2015.

In October 2018, the duo released "Die from a Broken Heart" and followed that up with

In a 2021 interview with the River News, Brust said the two get excited about the Hodag because of the fans they'll be perform-

The **DOS** and **DON'TS** of the chair line

One of the most anticipated parts of the Hodag Country Festival takes places before the talent takes the stage. The chair line procedure has been tweaked a bit over the years, so it's always a good idea to review the rules.

This year's chair line process is as follows, according to the festival website.

2023 Chair Line Rules

The Hodag Country Festival chair line is a lottery-style system that provides an equal opportunity for all who participate. The chair line is an option many Hodagers enjoy; it is not mandatory to participate. Chairs can be put out any time after the chair line event is complete.

There are three simple steps if you want to participate in the chair line:

1. COLLECT VOUCHER STUBS

Obtaining a voucher this year will be simplified as every 9-day ticket has a chair line voucher stub attached to it. Get your "chair family" together by having one member of your party collect voucher stubs from everyone in your group. Just take the voucher stub off the ticket by tearing along the perforation. It would be nice if you would put the voucher stubs in numerical order before the next step! Hodag Country Festival is not responsible for misplaced voucher stubs.

2. SPIN THE WHEEL FOR A LANYARD


You will bring the voucher stubs to the Festival with you to spin the Chair Line Wheel for a color!

The wheel will be located in the Pavilion and you can spin it between the hours of 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. Saturday, July 1 through Monday, July 3, and Tuesday, July 4, 9 a.m. and 8 p.m. Only one person from your group needs to be present to spin the wheel.

When you spin for a color, your color will correspond with a time. The time corresponding with the colors will be drawn in the Pavilion at 8:05 p.m. on Tuesday, July 4 and announced via Facebook, email blast, Twitter and Instagram after 8:05 p.m. That corresponding time is when you can make your way to the seating area on Wednesday, July 5, 2023 with your chairs to set out.

After you spin, you will be given a lanyard that shows your number of verified chairs and your color. This lanyard is what will give you access to the seating area during your designated time slot.

3. PUT YOUR CHAIRS OUT

When it is your time to enter the seating area, there only needs to be one person present to set out your chairs; but if you have a larger group, you may have more than one person to assist.

There will be eight areas of entry to the seating area that will be clearly marked. People that are loitering with chairs before their assigned time are subject to having their lanyard revoked. Without a lanyard, you will have to wait until the final time slot is over to place your chairs.
